With the support of the TK board, Nkum has also led a realignment of staff duties and has facilitated the relocation of some management and leadership spaces. "It's all about looking to the future and meeting the growing demand for our services," Nkum says.

## **MELISSA'S JOURNEY TO JOY**

# 'Now, I can love again'

It was time for a change. After more than three decades of living with addiction, it was time for Melissa to get off the street, get out of homeless shelters, get off drugs, and get back to living.

It was time, she says, to leave behind so many things—the impact of the hurt she suffered by being abused as a little girl, the memories of doing what she had to do to survive on the streets of Vancouver, and the burden of knowing that her lifestyle choices had alienated the people she loved the most—her three children.

All those thoughts and more were going through her head when she walked into

Starr House in September of 2024 and began a journey—albeit a rocky and resentful one, at times—that has now taken her to a place she always longed to be: clean and sober with a new outlook on life.

"I feel really good," Melissa, 44, said in an early-August chat at a Coquitlam coffee shop.

'This time I get to do it sober. I'm very grateful.'

"And I know that what I'm doing now, my children will be able to look at it in the future and know that their mother actually tried. They may not be in my life now but, you know, just by setting an example ..."

Touched by emotion, Melissa doesn't finish the sentence, but the satisfied and somewhat wry smile on her face tells you all you need to know about how Talitha Koum's recovery program has kindled another bright light for the universe. Melissa, a lifelong Lower Mainland resident, speaks candidly of the turbulence and addiction in her upbringing. It was while in foster care, she says, that "the older girls" showed her how to inject drugs and live on the streets. She was just 11 years old when she first shot up cocaine, and 12 when she suffered her first overdose. "Just

ridiculous, eh?" she says. "Coming out of the Balmoral at Main and Hastings ... It was not good, not good." She credits a loving relationship with a man for getting her off the streets and off hard drugs. Melissa recounts a long, at times hopeful and at other times sorrowful, tale of recovery, heartbreak, tragedy, and an ultimate descent into the two years leading up to her arrival at TK—two years of drug addiction, homelessness, and three attempts at recovery.

An acquaintance steered her toward Talitha Koum, and she entered Starr House with a determination to finally make it work. "I just had enough. I was sick of the way I was living—on the streets, in shelters, on people's floor. I knew it was time to change." It wasn't easy though. "When I came to TK ... I was still running on self-will," she says. "I had to learn how to surrender. It's a miracle." And there's more: "I was hateful when I came in. I didn't want anyone to hug me. Now, I can love again. That's what they do at TK. They love you until you can love again."

Melissa proudly points to the fact that she had recently marked the one-year anniversary of being off crack cocaine, and was nearing the same mark for quitting marijuana. She says she loves living at TK's third-stage transition home, Redemption House, and is looking forward to getting back on her feet again—"This time I get to do it sober ... I'm very grateful."

Already committed to giving back, she meets with new clients almost every week and shares some hard-earned advice: "I'm so happy every time I meet a new client. I say 'Stay. Don't leave. You won't regret it."
